The following passage has been adapted from 'The Old Curiosity Shop' by Charles Dickens. Read it carefully and answer the questions which follow.

The Jolly Sandboys was a small roadside inn of pretty ancient date, with a sign, 1 2 representing three Sandboys increasing their jollity with as many jugs of ale and bags of 3 gold, creaking and swinging on its post on the opposite side of the road. As the travellers 4 had observed that day many indications of their drawing nearer and nearer to the race 5 town, such as gipsy camps, carts laden with gambling booths and their appurtenances, itinerant showmen of various kinds, and beggars and tramps of every degree, all 6 7 wending their way in the same direction, Mr. Codlin was fearful of finding the 8 accommodations forestalled; this fear increasing as he diminished the distance between 9 himself and the hostelry, he quickened his pace, and notwithstanding the burden he had 10 to carry, maintained a round trot until he reached the threshold. Here he had the 11 gratification of finding that his fears were without foundation, for the landlord was leaning 12 against the doorpost looking lazily at the rain, which had by this time begun to descend 13 heavily, and no tinkling of cracked bell, nor boisterous shout, nor noisy chorus, gave note 14 of company within. 15 'All alone?' said Mr. Codlin, putting down his burden and wiping his forehead. 16 'All alone as yet,' rejoined the landlord, glancing at the sky, 'but we shall have more 17 company tonight I expect. Here one of you boys, carry that show into the barn. Make 18 haste in out of the wet, Tom; when it came on to rain I told 'em to make the fire up, and 19 there's a glorious blaze in the kitchen, I can tell you.' 20 Mr. Codlin followed with a willing mind, and soon found that the landlord had not 21 commended his preparations without good reason. A mighty fire was blazing on the 22 hearth and roaring up the wide chimney with a cheerful sound, which a large iron 23 cauldron, bubbling and simmering in the heat, lent its pleasant aid to swell. There was a 24 deep red ruddy blush upon the room, and when the landlord stirred the fire, sending the 25 flames skipping and leaping up--when he took off the lid of the iron pot and there rushed 26 out a savoury smell, while the bubbling sound grew deeper and more rich, and an 27 unctuous steam came floating out, hanging in a delicious mist above their heads--when he 28 did this, Mr. Codlin's heart was touched. He sat down in the chimney corner and smiled. 29 Mr. Codlin sat smiling in the chimney corner, eyeing the landlord as with a roguish look 30 he held the cover in his hand, and, feigning that his doing so was needful to the welfare of 31 the cookery, suffered the delightful steam to tickle the nostrils of his guest. The glow of 32 the fire was upon the landlord's bald head, and upon his twinkling eye, and upon his 33 watering mouth, and upon his pimpled face, and upon his round fat figure. Mr. Codlin 34 drew his sleeve across his lips, and said in a murmuring voice, 'What is it?' 35 'It's a stew of tripe,' said the landlord smacking his lips, 'and cow-heel,' smacking them 36 again, 'and bacon,' smacking them once more, 'and steak,' smacking them for the fourth 37 time, 'and peas, cauliflowers, new potatoes, and sparrow-grass, all working up together in 38 one delicious gravy.'
